



Safety First on the Forecourt

COURSE ELEMENTS

Element 1. What is Health and Safety?

Identify the main dangers to health and safety in the work place.
Explain the possible affects accidents and ill health on individuals and the company.
Explain your employer's legal responsibilities to health and safety.
Explain your legal responsibilities to health and safety.
Describe ways in which you may contribute to improve health and safety on your forecourt.

Element 2. Product and Flammability.

Identify that vapour is highly flammable even at low temperature.
Recognise that vapour is heavier than air and will collect in drains, etc.
Recognise that vapour will ignite given the conditions and relevance of the fire triangle.
Recognise that petrol will float on water and can travel long distances.
Identify the importance of site interceptors.
Recognise that the forecourt is a hazardous area and the relevance of this.
Recognise the importance of sources of ignition and distance.
Identify electrical faults, hot tyres, mobile phones, overheated / running engines, naked flames and smoking materials as potential sources of ignition.

Identify common sources of ignition arising from waste baskets.
Identify categories of fire ABC. Identify colour coding for extinguishers. Match extinguisher types of fire.

Element 3. Contamination and Health.

Identify the relevance of a flash point.
Recognise that mixtures of petrol with other products could dramatically lower the flash point.
Recognise that the contamination of petrol with other products may cause damage to the vehicle. Recognise that products can be hazardous to health if inhaled, ingested or comes into contact with the eyes. Identify the symptoms occurring and the action to be taken if petrol vapour or liquid inhaled.
Identify the symptoms occurring and the action to be taken if product is swallowed.
Identify the symptoms occurring and the action to be taken if product gets into eyes.
Identify the symptoms occurring and the action to be taken if the product comes into contact with the skin.

Element 4. Forecourt Safety Procedures.

Identify the procedure for dealing with minor spills at the pumps.
Identify the procedure for dealing with major spills at the pumps.
Identify the procedure for dealing with suspected leak.

Identify the procedure for dealing with an accident.
Identify the procedure for dealing with personal injury
Identify the procedure for dealing with a fire due to spillage of less than 10 litres of petrol.
Identify the procedure for dealing with a fire due to the spillage of more than 10 litres of petrol. Identify the procedure for dealing with a fire due to a gas leak.
Identify the procedure for dealing with a fire due to site electrical fault.
Identify the procedure for dealing with a fire due to vehicle electrical fault.
Identify the procedure for dealing with a fire due to a vehicle burning tyre.
Identify the procedure for dealing with a fire due to a burning waste container.
Recognise the service station safety procedures manual as available for guidance.

Element 5. Forecourt Hazard.

Recognize potential hazards on the forecourt.
Understand the need for correct manual handling techniques.
Understand what to do with hazardous substances.
Recognise the need for PPE (Personal Protective Equipment).
